### Report of the Head of Regulatory and Community Safety Lead Member: Councillor Shona Rattray

#### Part A

#### PUBLIC SPACES PROTECTION ORDER ('PSPO') – CHARNWOOD CONTROL OF DOGS 2023

##### Purpose of Report

To seek approval of the Notice of Intention and upon expiry of the 28-day notice period to approve the Public Spaces Protection Order (Charnwood Borough Council) Control of Dogs 2023 under the provisions of the Anti-Social Behaviour Crime and Policing Act 2014.

##### Recommendations

1. That Cabinet decide on which option to include in the Notice of Intention for Stonebow Washlands, Loughborough:  
Option 1 - to maintain the existing restriction of dogs on leads by direction on the playing fields (yellow zone on the map – shown in Appendix C) OR  
Option 2 - to extend the restriction to dogs on leads on the playing fields (yellow zone on the map)
2. That the Notice of Intention, attached in Appendix A, be approved, and issued once the schedule of areas is amended to reflect the Cabinet decision at point 1.
3. That if there are no objections the draft Public Spaces Protection Order ('PSPO'), attached at Appendix B be approved as drafted after the expiry of the 28 days' notice period.
4. That the Head of Regulatory and Community Safety, in consultation with the Lead Member for Business Support, be given delegated authority to amend and make the Order if there are only minor alterations required.
5. That the Head of Regulatory and Community Safety, in consultation with the Lead Member for Business Support, be given delegated authority to make revisions and amendments to the Order in response to future requests for additional dog controls (for requests which cover no more than one ward).
6. That the Head of Regulatory and Community Safety, in consultation with the Lead Member for Business Support, be given delegated authority to extend the Order if there are no major changes required to the Order at the renewal time (January 2026).
7. That the Head of Regulatory and Community Safety, in consultation with the Lead Member for Business Support, be given delegated authority to authorise staff at

Parish/Town Councils or other organisations, as deemed appropriate, to issue fixed penalty notices for dog control offences.

### Reasons

1. To enable Cabinet to decide on the preferred option whether to maintain or extend the current restrictions after considering the evidence, as detailed in the background papers, put forward during the consultation period and specifically regarding Stonebow Washlands, Loughborough.
2. To inform the public about the content of the proposed PSPO and give a formal opportunity for them to raise comments.
3. To vary and extend the PSPO under the provisions of the Anti-Social Behaviour Crime and Policing Act 2014, to address anti-social behaviour issues relating to dog control and to ensure the law-abiding majority can use and enjoy public spaces.
- 4&5. To enable relevant revisions to the PSPO subject to evidence of dog control issues in an area (revisions impacting on more than one Ward will require Cabinet approval).
6. To enable renewal of the PSPO if there are no major changes required.
7. To assist Town/Parish Councils and other suitable organisations in the ability to offer an enhanced enforcement service in addition to the provision from the Council.

### Policy Justification and Previous Decisions

This action meets with the Council's value for working together: 'We work together with pace and positivity as one council and in partnership with others. It also meets with the Council's value 'Pride in Charnwood': 'We take pride in our work and our borough and are ambitious for the future'.

The PSPO also contributes to achieving the themes within the Corporate Strategy 2020-2024 'Caring for the Environment and Healthy Communities'.

The Anti-Social Behaviour Crime and Policing Act 2014 was introduced in October 2014. The Act introduced Public Spaces Protection Orders to last for up to 3 years. This Act replaced the Dogs Fouling of Land Act 1996 which was repealed so dog fouling across the whole borough is automatically included in the Order.

The Council currently has a PSPO which started in January 2020. The PSPO can last for up to 3 years so a consultation was undertaken so that following a review of the feedback a decision could be made whether to extend and/or vary the existing PSPO.

There are a few locations which need to be included on the schedule. Taking this into consideration it is decided to opt for a variation to cover the new locations and an extension to extend the order for a further 3 years.

There are a number of areas of open space within the Order, so the Environmental Services Team were consulted with. This helped gain a full understanding of each site, its uses, and aspirations for the land for the future. The consensus was that they would like to maintain all existing restrictions at this time, including the dogs on leads by direction restriction on the playing fields at Stonebow Washlands (yellow zone). This consultation helped to form the proposals for the notice of intention.

Legal Services were approached throughout the process for advice on restrictions in the order as outlined in the Anti-social Behaviour Crime and Policing Act. They also offered a legal viewpoint on evidence put forward which helped to form the proposals within the notice of intention.

Implementation Timetable including Future Decisions and Scrutiny

If Cabinet approval is granted and following the call-in period, the timetable will be as follows:

- A Notice to make an Order and draft PSPO will be published with a 28-day notice period to allow for comments on the proposed PSPO.
- Review of comments and decision made on terms of PSPO.
- If no objections are received, then the Order will be made as drafted.
- If there are minor objections or need for alterations, the Head of Regulatory and Community Safety will amend and make the Order.
- If there are major objections a further Cabinet report will be written for a decision at Cabinet to revise or not and progress with the PSPO.

After this point, the PSPO will be published on the Council website and in paper format with an implementation date.

Report Implications

The following implications have been identified for this report.

*Financial Implications*

The financial implications of the PSPO will involve additional signage for new areas outlined during the consultation. These are estimated to be £500 for rigid plastic signs and attachments. These costs will be met within the existing budgets.

*Risk Management*

The risks associated with the decision Cabinet is asked to make and proposed actions to mitigate those risks are set out in the table below.

### *Crime and Disorder*

PSPOs are intended to deal with a particular nuisance or problem in a particular area that is detrimental to the local community's quality of life, by imposing conditions on the use of that area which apply to everyone.

The PSPO will add clarity to people living and visiting the Borough about expectations in relation to dog control.

Enforcement of the PSPO will also send out a strong message to people that allowing a dog to foul and not clearing away afterwards or not keeping a dog under control is unacceptable and anti-social.

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## Part B

### Background

1. The Anti-social Behaviour Crime and Policing Act 2014 brought in Public Spaces Protection Orders (PSPOs) for the control of a range of ASB issues, including problems relating to dog control.
2. The existing PSPO was introduced on 7<sup>th</sup> January 2020 and will expire on 6<sup>th</sup> January 2023. There are four main areas within the order:
  - Dog Fouling – this covers dog fouling offences on areas of land within the Borough which are open to the air and to which the public have access whether by payment or not.
  - Dogs on lead – Dogs should always be on lead within specified areas.
  - Dogs on Leads by Direction – this applies to specific areas of land where it makes it an offence not to put a dog on a lead if directed by an Authorised Officer.
  - Dogs Exclusion - this applies to fenced children's play areas where there is a sign in place where it makes it an offence to allow your dog into these areas.

### Development of PSPOs

3. The main proposals for changes to the current PSPO is to replace the existing controls for dog fouling, dogs on leads and dog's exclusion with similar provisions and to include the following additional requirements:
  - a) Extend OR maintain the existing restriction of dogs on lead by direction on the playing fields area (yellow zone) at Stonebow Washlands, Loughborough.
  - b) Merge the existing PSPO Variation May 2022 Dog Control – Stonebow Washlands and Dishley Pool into the borough wide Order.
  - c) Add new locations to the schedule for dog exclusion zones:
    - (i) Butler Way Play area, Sileby
    - (ii) Harlequin Drive play area, Sileby
    - (iii) Millfield Play area, Anstey
    - (iv) Fairhaven Farm Estate Playing Fields, Anstey
    - (v) Bob Brown Memorial Field Play Park, Grey Crescent, Newtown Linford
  - d) Add a new location for dogs on leads at all time
    - (i) Closed Churchyard, All Saints' Church, Bradgate Road, Newtown Linford

4. In establishing which restrictions or requirements should be included in the PSPO, the Council needs to ensure that the measures are necessary to prevent a detrimental effect for those in the locality or reduce the likelihood of the detrimental effect continuing or recurring.
5. There are a number of areas of open space within the Order, so the Environmental Services Team were consulted to establish their views on the restrictions at the open space's sites. The consensus was that they would like to maintain all existing restrictions at this time, including the dogs on leads by direction restriction on the playing fields at Stonebow Washlands (yellow zone). Cabinet have been asked to decide on one of the options at Stonebow Washlands, which is managed by the Council. The options being either to extend or maintain the restriction based on the evidence supplied by an interested party.
6. Legal Services were also consulted for advice on thresholds of behaviour within the Anti-social Behaviour Crime and Policing Act to help form the proposals within the Notice of Intention.
7. A Notice of Intention is the final stage of the formal consultation process to offer a chance for the residents and interested parties to make comment or object to the proposals outlined on the draft PSPO.
8. Following review of the comments from the consultation at notice stage, the final set of measures is agreed. The PSPO will be published in accordance with the regulations made by the Secretary of State and must:
  - identify the activities having the detrimental effect.
  - explain the potential sanctions available on breach; and
  - specify the period for which the PSPO has effect.
9. The PSPO applies to the whole of the Borough of Charnwood. Detail about specific areas will be outlined in the PSPO Schedule; a draft copy is included within Appendix B.
10. The PSPO is required to enable enforcement to take place to deal with on-going problems of dog fouling and dog control incidents across the Borough, which has increased in number over the last 3 years.

### Consultation

11. At the start of the process it is a requirement to consult with the local Police and the Police and Crime Commissioner to share information about the area and the problems being caused.
12. It is also a requirement to consult with residents and organisations. A public consultation started in June 2022 to August 2022. The following groups were consulted using the methods outlined:
  - a) All residents – Charnwood Borough Council and on noticeboards in parish and town councils (virtual and physical).
  - b) All parish and town Councils – in writing.
  - c) Police and Crime Commissioner and Local Policing Body – in writing.

d) Borough Councillors via briefing note

13. The consultation results are summarised in the background papers. There was one member of public who put forward additional evidence to support an extension to the restriction on the playing fields (shown as yellow zone on the map used during the consultation) at Stonebow Washlands. In the Officer's opinion the majority of the listed incidents could be classed as a 'near miss' or typical animal behaviour where dogs have approached wildlife, but no injuries were caused.

Whilst these incidents against wildlife are unfortunate and saddening, the guidelines for the Anti-social Behaviour Crime and Policing Act recommend that restrictions within a PSPO need to be justified and proportionate. The provisions in the Act are to protect the community against anti-social behaviour.

Taking this additional evidence into consideration and to ensure the restriction is proportionate and justifiable, the existing restriction of dogs on leads by direction affords an enforcement tool to deal with dogs which are out of control or likely to become out of control whilst still allowing responsible dog owners to use this multi-use site to exercise their dogs off lead.

The Animal Welfare Act 2006 section 9 (2c) poses a duty on owners of animals to allow them to exhibit normal behaviour patterns i.e., to exercise, run, jump, and play. Stonebow Washlands is surrounded by residential properties and so therefore people use the site to exercise their dogs off leads on the playing fields, so these people also need to be considered when making a decision on restrictions for a location-based order.

However, dogs on lead by direction needs to be enforced to ensure compliance which requires a resource. The Rangers on site can advise but they do not have enforcement powers and it is not within their job description, so this relies on the Council resource which is already reduced and has to cover the whole borough. Therefore, from a resourcing viewpoint, dogs on leads may send a clearer message to visitors about expectations and help to prevent attacks if they are on leads at all times.

Any other specific areas identified for inclusion in the PSPO have been incorporated where suitable evidence has been collated.

14. The Notice of Intention offers a further opportunity for consultation where the public can make comments and raise objections. The Notice will be published on the Council website and in paper format at various points across the Borough where changes have been proposed.

#### Enforcement, Education and Campaigns

15. Any enforcement of legislation should be balanced with the need to educate people about the potential sanctions they may encounter if they do not comply with the law. The council runs various campaigns to make people aware of the various legislation in relation to environmental crime.

16. To enforce the PSPO in line with the relevant legal requirements and guidance, all officers will need to be fully trained and authorised. It will be enforced by the following:
- a) Street Wardens (Charnwood Borough Council)
  - b) Enviro Crime Enforcement Officers (Charnwood Borough Council)
  - c) Regulatory Services Enforcement Officers (Charnwood Borough Council)
  - d) Dog Warden(s) (Contractors for Charnwood Borough Council)
  - e) Groundsman and Enforcement Officer (Birstall Parish Council)
  - f) Dog Control Officer (Mountsorrel Parish Council)
17. It is also proposed, to work with Parish and Town Councils and other services within Charnwood Borough Council to authorise officers so they can help with enforcement of dog control in their area. This would apply where agreement has been reached with the Council and subject to training, vetting and authorisation.
18. Fixed penalty notices of £100 will be issued by authorised officers. A fixed penalty notice is a way of discharging liability and if paid will ensure closure of the matter. The fee can be reduced to £50 if paid within 10 days. Failure to pay the fixed penalty notice may result in prosecution.

#### Timetable and future stages

19. The timetable for completing the Public Spaces Protection Notice for Charnwood Borough Council is set out in the table below:

**NOTICE OF INTENTION TO MAKE A PUBLIC SPACES PROTECTION ORDER  
DOG CONTROL – CHARNWOOD BOROUGH COUNCIL**

Notice is hereby given that Charnwood Borough Council ('the Council') proposes for the purposes of reducing antisocial behaviour in relation to dog control to extend and a Public Spaces Protection Order under Section 61 and 60 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 and of all other enabling powers.

**The Council would like to seek your views on the proposed Notice of Intention to vary an order. This Notice outlines the details of the proposed variations to the Order in red ink in the schedules on page 2 and 3. Any comments and/or objections should be sent in writing or by email to the correspondence address below.**

At the closure of the formal consultation period, Charnwood Borough Council will review all comments/objections and will decide on whether to vary the order or an alternative in part or in full.

The variation from May 2022 at Stonebow Washlands, Loughborough and Dishley Pool, Loughborough will also be added into the main order so that there is one order in place for ease of understanding.

The Public Spaces Protection Order will seek to address anti-social behaviour issues relating to dog control across the Borough of Charnwood.

The majority of dog owners are responsible and display effective dog control but there are some occasions where additional controls are necessary to ensure all people in control of dogs are acting responsibly.

The Council takes the health and well-being of the residents very seriously, and seeks to promote a healthy, safe environment for all residents, protecting them from anti-social behaviour in the form of dog control issues. These issues include:

- Owners allowing dogs to foul and not clearing away afterwards
- Dogs defecating on graves at cemeteries/graveyards
- Dogs in dog exclusion zones where small children are playing
- Dogs not being kept under control on a lead near wildfowl and other animals causing distress and sometimes fatalities
- Dogs out of control in public areas

The effect of the Order will be to apply conditions to dog owners by:

- Insisting they clear up after their dogs if they foul forthwith

- Insisting all dogs are kept on leads in cemeteries which are owned/managed by Charnwood Borough Council or the Parish/town Councils
  - Insisting dogs are not to be taken into fenced children’s’ play areas
  - Insisting dogs are put on lead if directed by an authorised officer in areas outlined in schedule below.
- This Order applies to the public places described in the Schedule to this Order (“the restricted area”)

## APPENDIX B – Proposed Public Spaces Protection Order

### **The Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014**

#### **DATED**

### **The Public Spaces Protection Order – Dog Control Charnwood Borough Council 2023**

Charnwood Borough Council (“the Council”) in exercise of its power under section 60 and 61 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 (“the Act”) and of all other enabling powers being satisfied that that the conditions set out in section 60 and 61 of the Act have been met extends and varies the existing Public Spaces Protection Order – Dog Control Charnwood Borough Council 2020:

#### **1. Fouling**

If within the administrative area of the Council a dog defecates at any time on land to which the public or any section of the public has access, on payment or otherwise, as of right or by virtue of express or implied permission and a person who is in charge of the dog at that time fails to remove the faeces from the land forthwith, that person shall be guilty of an offence unless:

- (a) he has reasonable excuse for failing to do so: or
- (b) the owner, occupier or other person or authority having control of the land has consented (generally or specifically) to his failing to do so.

#### **2. Leads by Order**

A person in charge of a dog shall be guilty of an offence if, at any time, on land detailed in Schedule 1 does not comply with a direction given to him by an officer authorised by the Council to put and keep the dog on a lead (no more than 1.5 metres in length) unless:

- (a) he has reasonable excuse for failing to do so: or
- (b) the owner, occupier or other person or authority having control of the land has consented (generally or specifically) to his failing to do so.

#### **3. Leads**

A person in charge of a dog shall be guilty of an offence if, at any time, on land detailed in Schedule 2 below he does not keep the dog on a lead no more than 1.5 metres in length unless:

- (a) he has reasonable excuse for failing to do so: or

- (b) the owner, occupier or other person or authority having control of the land has consented (generally or specifically) to his failing to do so.

#### **4. Exclusion**

A person in charge of a dog shall be guilty of an offence if, at any time, he takes the dog onto, or permits the dog to enter or remain on, any land detailed in Schedule 3 below unless:

- (a) he has reasonable excuse for failing to do so: or  
(b) the owner, occupier or other person or authority having control of the land has consented (generally or specifically) to his failing to do so.

#### **5. Exemptions**

Nothing in this Order shall apply to a person who –

- (a) Is registered as a blind person in a register compiled under section 29 of the National Assistance Act 1948; or  
(b) Is deaf, in respect of a dog trained by Hearing Dogs for Deaf People (registered charity number 293358) and upon which he relies for assistance.  
(c) Is a member of Assistance Dogs UK; or  
(d) Has a disability which affects his mobility, manual dexterity, physical coordination or ability to lift, carry or otherwise move everyday objects, in respect of a dog trained by a prescribed charity and upon which he relies for assistance.

For the purpose of this Order –

- A person who habitually has a dog in his possession shall be taken to be in charge of the dog at any time unless at that time some other person is in charge of the dog.
- Placing the faeces in a receptacle on the land which is provided for the purpose, or the disposal of waste, shall be sufficient removal from the land.
- Being unaware of the defecation (whether by reason of not being in the vicinity or otherwise), or not having a device or other suitable means of removing the faeces shall not be a reasonable excuse for failing to remove the faeces.
- “An authorised officer of the Council” means an employee, partnership agency or contractor of Charnwood Borough Council who is authorised in writing by Charnwood Borough Council for the purposes of giving directions under the Order.
- Each of the following is a “prescribed charity” –
  - Dogs for the Disabled (registered charity number 700454)
  - Support Dogs Limited (registered charity 1088281)
  - Canine Partners for Independence (registered charity number 803680)

#### **6. Penalty**

A person who is guilty of an offence under this Order shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 3 on the standard scale.

A person may be offered a Fixed Penalty Notice of £100 by way of discharging liability for the offence. The Fixed Penalty Notice is reduced to £50 if paid within 10 days of issue.
